What is your vision for the future of Roxboro?

Lauren: The City of Roxboro's existing vision statement centers around encouraging a community that is safe, healthy, scenic, quaint, vibrant, family-oriented, and well-educated. Through recent adoption of a Joint Comprehensive Land Use Plan with Person County, and recent conversations with the City Council and Planning Board, we are taking steps to modernize our land use plans and policies to better reflect this vision.

Are there any upcoming projects or initiatives that the community should be excited about?

Lauren: Roxboro is currently exploring ways to update our Unified Development Ordinance to better reflect the needs of the community, and the Council's vision for growth. We are also working on implementation opportunities for various projects identified in our recently-updated Uptown Streetscape Plan and (hopefully soon-to-be adopted) Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan. While funding for construction projects is limited, we are looking for creative collaborations and low-cost/high-impact steps that can be taken to keep the momentum going.

What motivates you in your day to day work as the Planning and Development Director?

Lauren: As a native of Person County, I find that my greatest motivation is trying to do work that my parents and grandparents would be proud to know was a product of my efforts. Like so many in Roxboro and Person County, I have deep roots in our beautiful red clay. My work is truly a labor of love for the community that has been my home for the vast majority of my life. While we are growing and seeing changes, it is my hope that I can use my uniquely-personal knowledge of our community to advocate for growth that will augment this already special place to call home.

Don't Leaf Trash Behind: Join the NCDOT Fall Sweep

SHIIP Saves Seniors Thousands of Dollars

The <u>Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP)</u> counsels Medicare beneficiaries abut Medicare, Medicare supplements Medicare Advantage, Medicare Part D, and long-term care insurance. North Carolina Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey today announced that the Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) saved the state's seniors \$30 million last year.

Many retirees and Medicare beneficiaries on a fixed income want to save money wherever they can. Each year, thousands of people contact SHIIP throughout the state to help them identify savings in their Medicare coverages.

"These savings are valuable to older North Carolinians, many of whom are on a fixed income," Commissioner Causey said. "Now they can use them to spend as they see fit."



In 2023 SHIIP saved Medicare beneficiaries the following amount in each county in **Kerr-Tar Region K:**

Franklin: \$541,107Granville: \$510,466Person: \$16,643

Vance: \$26,644Warren: \$24,525

Number of people served: 1316


