- Find Your Polling Location: Use your state's election website to locate where you should vote.
- Bring Necessary ID: Check if your state requires photo ID and make sure to bring it.
- Plan Your Time: Voting hours vary, so plan ahead to ensure you have time to vote.
- Review Your Ballot: Take your time to ensure your selections are accurate before submitting.
- Request a Provisional Ballot if Necessary: If there's any issue with your registration, you have the right to a provisional ballot.

The Kerr-Tar Regional Broadband Planning Committee will consist of an actively engaged group that will:



NC MS&RP Development Workshop



What is it?

Fostering small-scale development is key to creating a strong downtown or neighborhood commercial district. A small-scale developer rehabs one building at a time, learning as they go, and completes a custom project with the rehabilitation of each building. These developments translate into new businesses, jobs, and housing units, and most importantly, they catalyze incremental investments in downtowns and neighborhood commercial districts for continued economic growth.

Join us to learn how economic development professionals can take the mystery out of redevelopment and grow more local developers for your community. This day-long training is intended for any North Carolina community that has a commercial National Register Historic District or a commercial district that is on the National Register Study List.

This training will position small-scale developers and the local staff, such as Main Street programs, city staff, and local economic development staff, that developers will work with to better understand the process of using historic tax credits as a funding mechanism to redevelop historic commercial properties.

These workshops are hosted by the NC Department of Commerce Main Street & Rural Planning Center, the NC Department of Natural & Cultural Resources State Historic Preservation Office, and the host community.

Who should attend?

Anyone who supports the redevelopment of historic properties, including but not limited to, Main Street Directors, Economic Developers, Historic Preservationists, City/Town Staff, including building inspectors and fire marshals, CPA's, Architects, Engineers, and especially, Small Scale Developers working in small to mid-sized communities, and Downtown or Neighborhood Commercial District Property Owners.

Grant Opportunity: T-Mobile Hometown Grant



T-Mobile is committing up to \$25 million through 2026 to support small towns, villages, and territories across America by funding community projects.

Carolinas Renewable Energy Development Assistance and Siting Hub



(DASH)





On March 25, 2024, as part of President Biden's Investing in America Agenda, the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) announced six state-based projects that will receive federal funding through the <u>Renewable Energy Siting through Technical Engagement and Planning (R-STEP)</u> grant.

One of the awarded projects is a collaborative project between North and South Carolina called the **Carolinas Renewable Energy Development Assistance and Siting Hub (DASH)**, and it is being led by NC State University's North Carolina Clean Energy Technology Center (NCCETC). The NCCETC is partnering with the NC State Cooperative Extension, the Center for Energy Education, the South Carolina Energy Office, and the Southeastern Wind Coalition to carry out the project.

COMMUNITY MEETINGS

As part of the Carolinas Renewable Energy DASH, NCCETC is hosting community meetings throughout the Carolinas to better understand local concerns and thoughts about large-scale solar and wind energy project development.

FEEDBACK WILL ALLOW US TO:

- Identify topics & questions for future educational community workshops and;
- Shape the project's online technical assistance hub with resources for communities across the Carolinas.

Housed under the <u>U.S. DOE Office</u> of Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy (EERE) in collaboration with EnergyWerx, R-STEP is intended to be a "go-to" resource for information and engagement when it comes to state-based renewable energy planning siting, and permitting.

Duke Energy Foundation Awards KTCOG for Chestnut Street Park

The Duke Energy Foundation has awarded Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments with \$10568.00 for the Chestnut Street Park project. The Chestnut Street Park revitalization project is an Adopt-A-Park community volunteer lead project to enhance the city park in that neighborhood. By acquiring this grant we will utilize unused park space to increase park



participation and visitation. Making this park a more family orientated location for birthday parties, community events and safe haven for citizens in this area. The request submitted to the Foundation was to purchase picnic tables, benches, and ADA accessible tables for guests to enjoy the beautification of Chestnut Street Park—estimated to begin construction in Spring 2025. Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments is thrilled to collaborate with the City of Henderson and the Duke Energy Foundation for the benefit of Henderson's residents and visitors. Regional Project Manager Amanda Lewis emphasized, "Without strong community partnerships, these projects would not be possible. Thank you Duke Energy Foundation, the City of Henderson, and CJ Turrentine for their shared alignment focus on Vibrant Economies, Climate Resiliency, and Opportunity and Inclusion."

FEMA Awards Cybersecurity Grant to the Town of Warrenton

On October 14th the Town Administrator Robert Davie announced that The Town of Warrenton was awarded a \$165,837.39 cybersecurity grant provided by FEMA through the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program. Our grant writer, Amanda Lewis provided technical assistance for this grant that will provide Warrenton with the security measures to prevent phishing attacks. According to the Warren Record, Davie said "The grant funding will allow Warrenton to convert all emails to a Microsoft security app. He said that the grant includes four years of Microsoft products plus six years of incident response."

2024 NADO Conference: New Orleans






Success Stories
