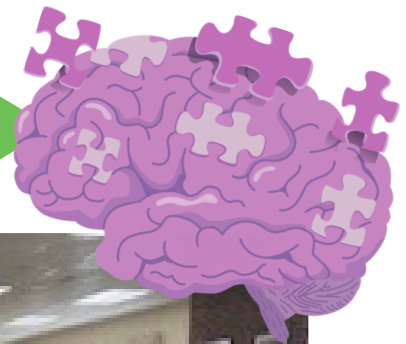


FTC Resources: Shareable Materials to Combat Scams

Silver Alert Update

Dementia Alliance of North Carolina wants to make the public aware of an important change to North Carolina’s Silver Alert program. In 2023, this system was updated to the “Missing Endangered Alert”. Now operated through the N.C. Center for Missing Persons, a Missing Endangered Alert will provide a statewide system for the rapid dissemination of information regarding a missing person of any age who is believed to have a cognitive impairment.

Criteria are as follows:

- Believed to have a cognitive impairment (not medical).
- Reported Missing to law Enforcement within 72 hours.
- In danger of abuse, physical harm, neglect, or exploitation.

If a loved one is missing:

- Family and friends should immediately notify local law enforcement and file a police or sheriff’s report.
- Include information on where the missing person was last known to be. Provide officers with a recent photo as soon as possible.
- Request that law enforcement put out a “Be On the Lookout” (BOLO) Bulletin.
- Ask for an organized search with tracking dogs, if possible.
- If the missing person has any cognitive impairment, ask local law enforcement to have a Missing Endangered Alert issued.
- Limit access to your home until law enforcement investigators arrive and have collected evidence.
- Give the investigator all facts and circumstances related to the disappearance, including what efforts have already been made.
- Write a detailed description of clothing and any personal belongings the person may have.
- Designate one person to answer your telephone. Keep a pad of paper by the phone to jot down names, telephone numbers, dates, and times of calls about your person.



Beware of Holiday Scams

Scam artists target senior adults during the holidays, especially if the targets are lonely and depressed. Please be mindful of online shopping scams on fake websites, frauds imitating grandchildren in trouble and needing money immediately, fake charities seeking charitable donations, and phishing emails.

concerns in legislation occurring in the digital space and what impact this has on consumers and financial institutions. Key challenges highlighted included the role of transnational crime syndicates as major drivers of scams and the mixed willingness of financial institutions to enforce anti-fraud measures. The roundtable also addressed the need for stronger policies across industries like social media, telecommunications, and law enforcement. The discussion emphasized the importance of consumer education, citing resources like the FTC's "Pass It On" campaign and outreach programs. Participants agreed that collaboration across industries, educators, and policymakers is essential to combat elder fraud effectively while safeguarding consumer rights.

Advancing Connectivity: Granville County's Digital Inclusion Plan

The Granville County Digital Inclusion Plan was presented at the Granville County Board of Commissioners Regular Meeting on November 18, 2024.

Amanda Lewis, Regional Project Manager, reviewed the scope of the project and strategic alignment. The Digital Inclusion Project was made possible through an award from



BAND-NC to support the five-county region in developing County Digital Inclusion Plans and a Regional Digital Inclusion Plan. Public Information Officer and Grants Manager Terry Hobgood, Granville County Library Director Will Robinson, and Library Branch Manager Lisa Dendy, formed the county team, providing essential information for the plan. They collaborated regularly with the Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments and supported the project. The plan incorporated Granville County's branding, including its logo and color hex code. Key steps included a stakeholder meeting on April 18, 2024, to define the Vision, Mission, and Values statements and set priorities. Data collection from the NC DIT survey, community resources, and public Wi-Fi locations informed the plan. Granville County facilitated survey outreach by posting it in local government buildings, businesses, and libraries. The plan aligned with regional and state strategies, emphasizing cybersecurity education and future training opportunities.

NCDIT Partners with NC 211 to Expand Digital Access Across North Carolina The North Carolina Department of Information Technology's (NCDIT) Division of Broadband and Digital Equity has partnered with NC 211 to provide statewide access to community resources supporting internet affordability, digital devices, skills, and

tech support. NC 211, a service powered by United Way, connects residents with essential services and now offers digital literacy support, including help setting up email, finding free Wi-Fi, and locating computer classes. Governor Roy Cooper highlighted the importance of digital access for all North Carolinians, especially during emergencies. The service is available 24/7 in multiple languages. Opportunity for Local Governments: Planning for Extreme Heat Cohort Program



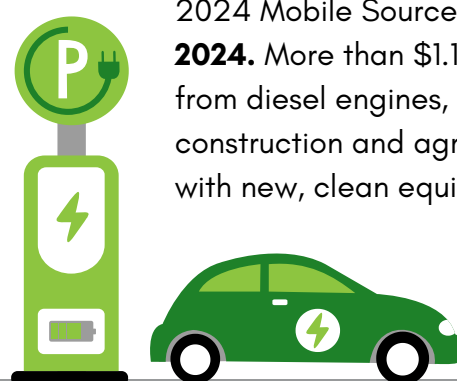
NCORR and the State Climate Office of North Carolina are launching a new technical assistance program for local governments. We hope you will share the invitation for this program with the communities you serve. The NC Office of Recovery and Resilience (NCORR) and the State Climate Office of North Carolina are launching the Planning for Extreme Heat Cohort Program to assist local governments in addressing extreme heat impacts. This program will help participants understand how heat affects their communities and develop strategies using the provided Heat Action Plan Toolkit. Participants will create a heat action plan, identify priority heat-response actions, and collaborate with heat experts and local partners. The program is a collaboration with the NC Department of Health and Human Services, Duke University Heat Policy Innovation Hub, NC State University, and the NOAA Carolinas Climate Adaptation Partnership. Local government staff and elected officials, along with community organizations, are invited to apply [HERE](#) by December 4, 2024. There is no cost to participate, aside from staff time commitment.

DEQ Accepting Applications for EV Charger and Diesel Emission Reduction Grants



The North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality's Division of Air Quality (DAQ) today is releasing requests for proposals (RFPs) for two grant programs aimed at reducing air pollution from the transportation sector: One for electric

vehicle chargers and another for clean vehicle replacements. Applications for the 2024 Mobile Sources Emissions Reductions Grant will be accepted through **Dec. 31, 2024**. More than \$1.1 million is available to fund projects that will reduce emissions from diesel engines, including the replacement or repowering of school buses, nonroad construction and agricultural equipment, heavy-duty on-road vehicles, and locomotives with new, clean equipment and vehicles. 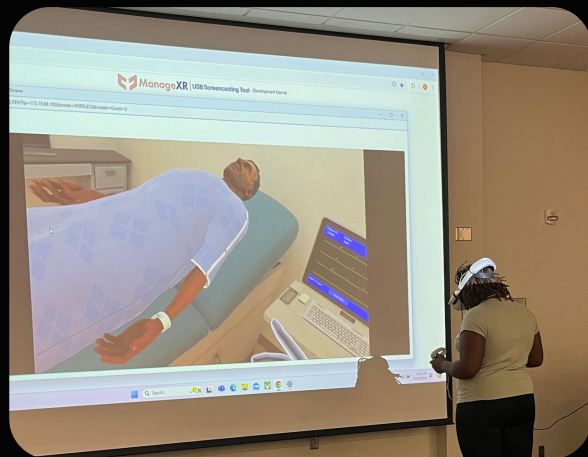
NCWorks at the RHA Annual Expo

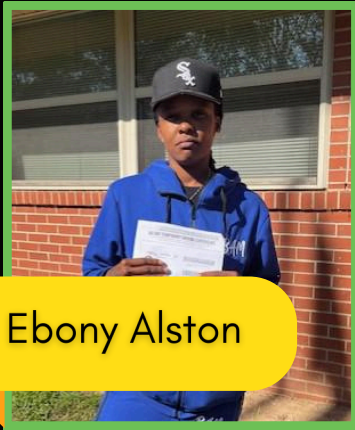


VR Brings Manufacturing Careers to Life at PCC Event

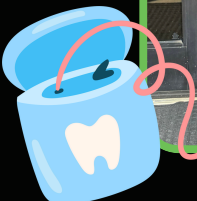
